

DESCRIPTION OF SUCCESSFUL READING PROGRAMME

Łódź, Poland / 2008-2009 Children in the age 4-8 years old

Short Description (Max. 200 words)

The programme "Peter Cat – playing with a book" was based on the cooperation among Łódź University, kindergartens, primary schools and public libraries in Łódź. The stories about Peter Cat as well as the ready-to-use activities were available on the website www.kotpiotrek.pl. The texts were expected to be used for fun, stimulation and creativity. They were also a means of communication between children and their educators (teachers and librarians). The programme started with a seminar for teachers, students, librarians and parents, who volunteered to create the stories and the activity plans. Then they disseminated the programme among the educational institutions in the city.

Objectives (General & Specific)

General Objectives:

- to promote reading and inspire educators and children to use reading material in playing together.
- to prove, that even with a small but motivated staff and a very limited budget, it is still possible to organise successful reading promotion activities and reach out to different groups of children.

Specific Objectives:

Children were expected to

- be inspired to share their thoughts and feelings with other students
- to spend exciting time, playing with literary texts.
- to discover close connections between literature, other arts and pleasure.
- to develop art skills of children

Scheme of Reading Promotion Actions & Activities

The programme included the following actions and activities, led by public libraries:

- Games that involved books
- Creative writing
- Dramatization of book excerpts
- Drawing characters and scenes from books
- Making crosswords
- Making quizzes
- Activities involving music and dance
- Dramatization of stories invented by the pupils
- Watching theatre or film versions of books
- Illustrating stories, using different art techniques
- Making own exhibitions
- Reading promotion poster competition
- Trips to visit exhibitions







Results / Indicators of Success

The participating teachers and librarians judged the programme as being successful. A total of 1500 children from schools and kindergartens took part.

Indicators of success were:

- positive atmosphere among children and educators
- intense creativity of participating children
- involvement of the children in the activities
- improvement of social skills
- good results from the group work
- increasing children's knowledge of literature
- increasing children's skills of creating their own stories
- introduction of students to new methods of learning through books
- the children's communication with their teachers
- creation of many new ideas for activities, useful for teachers and librarians, based on the stories about Peter Cat.

CONCLUSIONS

(WHAT WORKED WELL AND WHY)

- It was very important, that many teachers, librarians, university students and parents took part in the programme as volunteers.
- Enough time and effort was devoted to creating new activities, based on literature and art.
- The total programme was financed by the Ministry of Culture, what was very important for the participating institutions.
- Children were actively involved and engaged in all aspects of the programme
- Creative thinking was a very important aspect of the programme.
- The programme needed close cooperation between educational and cultural institutions and focussed on increasing the awareness of children to the importance of reading in their lives.
